Audition

The submitted video recordings of the required repertoire will be the basis for selection of contestants in the First Round of the competition (fifteen contestants, as a rule). The results of this audition will be announced by Tuesday, February 28, 2023 on the official website.

Applicants chosen to participate in the competition will receive formal notification and related documents by e-mail. Inquiries concerning the result of the audition will not be accepted.

Required Repertoire for Audition

Applicants should prepare the following two works.

- a) Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750): Allein Gott in der Höh sei Ehr BWV 676
- b) Robert Schumann (1810-1856): "6 Studien für den Pedalflügel" Op. 56 No. 4

Recording Requirements

- Record your performance from the side so that your whole body is visible (your recording must include visual, as well as audio), then upload the recording to YouTube as a limited release video and write the URL of the video on your application form.
- Record the video in the following order: Bach, then Schumann, and upload the recording as a single video.
- Recordings must have been recorded within three months of the submission date.
- Recordings must be made using a pipe organ, but depending upon the recording, different instruments may be used.
- Absolutely no editing of the video recording is allowed. However, the pieces by Bach and Schumann may be recorded separately.
- The title of the video should include the applicant's name (using the Roman alphabet). Make sure to include only the date and location of the recording in the YouTube description area (in English).

* As far as is possible, the audio and video recordings should be of high quality.

Required Repertory

First Round: a) and b) to be freely selected by the contestant, and the order of performance shall be determined by the contestant.

a) Johann Sebastian Bach: Praeludium et Fuga in G BWV 541

or in G BWV 550

b) Johannes Brahms (1833-1897): "11 Choralvorspiele" Op. 122

4. Herzlich tut mich erfreuen

or 10. Herzlich tut mich verlangen

c) Olivier Messiaen (1908-1992): "L'ascension"

3. Transports de joie d'une ame devant la gloire du Christ qui est la sienna

Second Round: a) and c) are to be selected by the contestant, and the order of performance shall be determined by the contestant.

a) Jan Pieterszoon Sweelinck (1562-1621): Esce Mars

or Heinrich Scheidemann (1595-1663): Toccata in G WV 43 (*long version)

- b) Johann Jakob Froberger (1616-1667): Fantasia sopra Ut, Re, Mi, Fa, Sol, La FbWV 201
- c) Georg Muffat (1653-1704): one Toccata from "Apparatus musico-organisticus"
- d) Johann Sebastian Bach: Fuga in d BWV 539

Finals

The Finals for this competition will comprise recitals by each of the finalists, consisting of their own selections. One or more original compositions for organ written in or after 2001 must be included in the program. The time allotted for each contestant is between forty (40) and fifty (50) minutes, without breaks; including entrances, exits, and time between pieces.

Requirements for Finals

- The contestant's selections for the Finals should include the following details: composer, title (in the original language) and the performing length of each selection. Also include the reason for your selection of repertoire. These details must be entered into the online web form at the time of application to the competition.
- Once submitted, any changes in a contestant's program are not permitted.
- Selections from the required repertory of the First and the Second Rounds are not to be used in the Finals.
- Works chosen are to be limited to those originally composed for performance on pipe organs.

Age Limit for Applicants

Persons born on or after January 1,1988 are eligible to participate.

Period for acceptance of applications

December 20 (Tuesday), 2022 through January 20 (Friday), 2023, by 23:59, Japan Standard Time. *Please inquire to the Secretariat if the applicant has not received confirmation by email by Tuesday, January 31, 2023.

*Include the following data with your application

- One high resolution photo of yourself from the waist up, facing the camera.
- A letter of recommendation by an organ teacher or other specialist in Japanese or English. The data should be included as either a PDF or a scan of the original.
- A scan of your passport or other official document that includes your name and date of birth.
 - * A link to the limited access YouTube video uploaded must be included in the application.
 - * Data submitted to the competition is solely for screening purposes. However, photos and profiles will be used for the program and for publicity purposes.

2 Participation fee

A fee of 15,000 Japanese Yen shall be paid in any of the following ways. Any fees incurred in the transfer of funds will be the responsibility of the applicant. Also, the fee must be transferred as Japanese Yen during the application period.

*As a matter of policy, fees paid to the competition are non-refundable. However, if unforeseeable circumstances, including natural disasters or the spread of disease cause the competition to be canceled, all fees paid will be returned at a later date.

Visa Procurement

The application and procurement of a visa is the responsibility of the individual contestant in the event that one is necessary for the contestant to enter Japan. Please contact the Secretariat if guarantor documents are required for visa application.

Travel Expenses

For the contestants of the First Round, travel expenses will be provided under the following conditions:

<Non-residents of Japan>

Travel expenses for contestants not resident in Japan will be covered either up to the actual flight cost or to the limit listed below, whichever is less. Travel cost support varies by geographical area, and will be paid in Japanese Yen to contestants at the September 6 (Wednesday) orientation. Contestants must bring a receipt or other document proving the cost of their airfare and submit it the day of the orientation. Any other travel expenses are the responsibility of the contestants.

Travel expense grants will be given after any necessary taxes are deducted. (The applicable tax rate is, in principle, 20.42% as of May 2022.)

<Residents of Japan>

Travel costs are the responsibility of the contestant in principle.

Lodging Expenses

Lodging expenses (not including meals) for the duration of the competition will be provided for those contestants requiring accommodations, from the evening of Wednesday, September 6, 2023 as follows:

- First-round contestants..... until the morning of Monday, September 11
- Second-round contestants..... until the morning of Friday, September 15
- Finalists.....until the morning of Monday (National Holiday), September 18
- Awardees.....until the morning of Tuesday, September 19
- First Prize winner.....until the morning of Thursday, September 21

Accommodations will be provided at a hotel designated by the competition sponsors.

Orientation

Contestants must attend the following orientation. Time: 15:00, Wednesday, September 6, 2023 Place: Musashino Civic Cultural Hall

Order of Performances

The order of performances and rehearsal times will be decided by drawing at the times given below:

- First Round...... at the time of orientation
- Second Round.... immediately following the announcement of Second Round contestants
- Finals.....immediately following announcement of finalists

Contestants must arrive at the hall by their given time. In the case of a late arrival, the chair of the executive committee, after conferring with the chair of the jury, may choose to allow that person to perform, provided it does not affect the progress of the competition.

Rehearsals

Contestants will be given rehearsal time at the competition venue. Practice time at other venues may also be provided for those desiring additional practice time. Applicants should state their preference at the time of application.

Registrants

Contestants must make provision for their own registrant, if one should be required. If an applicant wishes the secretariat to provide one, this should be noted in the application.

Judging

Judging will be conducted according to judging standards set by the Organizing Committee. No objections may be raised against the decisions of the jury.

Performance Rights

All competition-related performances become the legal property of the competition sponsor as noted below. Competitors may make no objections to this, nor may they request financial compensation for said performances.

- Radio or televised broadcasting or dissemination via Internet.
- Audio and/or visual recordings, whether broadcast or released online.
- Recording for the purposes of producing CDs, or the duplication and/or sale thereof.
- Taking of photographs and/or videos and the duplication thereof, as well as their distribution and/or sale.

Awards and Prizes

First Prize...... Award certificate and 1,200,000 Yen in prize money Second Prize......Award certificate and 800,000 Yen in prize money Third Prize.....Award certificate and 600,000 Yen in prize money *Taxes will be deducted from the above-mentioned prize money in accordance with Japanese tax law.

Other finalists.....Award certificate Audience Award (awarded to finalist selected by audience vote)Award certificate, souvenir

Other Awards

 A CD of the First Prize winner will be released from Naxos. The recording sessions are scheduled for Tuesday, September 19, and Wednesday, 20, 2023 at Musashino Civic Cultural Hall.
The First Prize winner will be provided the opportunity to perform on tour in Japan at the invitation of Musashino Foundation for Culture and Lifelong Learning in fiscal year 2025.

Prizewinners' Concert

Those who have been awarded First Prize, Second Prize, Third Prize, and the Audience Award, must perform in the Prizewinners' Concert to be held on Monday (National Holiday), September 18, 2023 at Musashino Civic Cultural Hall. Please note that performance fees are not to be paid.

Community Concert

Competitors who do not clear the first or second round may be invited to participate in a "Community Concert" (a mini concert utilizing a positive organ). Those who pass the audition will be contacted by the competition organization, and details will be decided at that time.

Addendum

Any issues arising in regard to the above articles are to be resolved in accordance with the meaning intended in the original Japanese language and according to Japanese law.
